

One hundred Women volunteer to build home on Woman's Day

One hundred women volunteers will help construct homes for two female homeowners on International Women's Day, which is today, Friday, March 8.

Organized by Lowe's and Habitat for Humanity Greater Orlando and Osceola County, the Women Build event will run from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Arbor Bend, 1221 S. Washington Ave., Apopka. The program starts at 8:30 a.m. Construction begins at 9.

As part of International Women's Day, Habitat for Humanity and Lowe's will cast light on the affordable housing crisis that women and children are facing world-

Catherine Steck Mc-Manus, president/CEO of Habitat Orlando and Osceola, and House District 45 Representative Kamia Brown of Ocoee will be present at the South Apopka event.

"Habitat Orlando and

Osceola believes every family deserves a safe and stable home," Betsy Culpepper, vice president of marketing and communications for Habitat for Humanity Greater Orlando and Osceola County, said in an email. "During Lowe's International Women Build Day, we are empowering women through messages of positivity, support and action; encouraging women to join a community of other women; (and) building each other up and raising a hammer to support a critical cause: safe and affordable housing. Together, we will create safe, stable homes globally."

Last year, Habitat for Humanity for Greater Orlando and Osceola County had a two-day Women Build, in which 216 participants raised \$73,000 for the nonprofit.

This year, the nonprofit is hosting four Women Build days: March 8 and 9, and May 10 and 11.

hroughout the Old Testament, the Israelites are told that if they keep the Law and follow God's commandments, they will be prosperous. The Book of Joshua is clear on this connection: "Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it.

Then you will be prosperous and successful." (Joshua 1:8 NIV) The prophet Malachi tells the Israelites that they are robbing God when they fail to give the full tithe, and God promises to "open the floodgates of heaven" if only the people will "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house." (Malachi 3:10

NIV)
The promise which God makes is that our generosity will be repaid

in full. Jesus summarizes this eternal law of human nature: "Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven. Give, and it will be given to you." (Luke 6:37-38 NIV) The apostle Paul reminds the Corinthians that stinginess and generosity have consequences as natural as the fruits which follow from their seeds:

'Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously." (2 Corinthians 9:6 NIV) We should not,

however, be generous as an insurance policy or an investment plan. Give from a pure motive to help others, and realize that the reward may be in a different coin, as it were.

Home improvements can increase home value and return of investment

When granite countertops or shiny, stainless steel appliances beckon homeowners from the display areas of home improvement stores, it's tempting to gear remodeling thoughts toward the items that will add flair and decorative appeal to a home. The ROI ranges from 123 percent at the highest, to 86 percent at the lowest - which is still a considerable investment return for such a simple project. Match the door's style with the style of the house for the best value.

· Turn up the kitchen heat. An attractive kitch-

a home's less attractive components. In the kitchen, replacement countertops, wall color changes, new cabinetry and flooring offer the biggest ROI.

· Dreaming of a new bedroom. Remodeling magazine also points to creating an attic bedroom to increase home value. The ROI of an attic remodel that adheres

to code can garner an 83 percent ROI.

· Home maintenance projects. There's little good to improving the aesthetic appeal and functionality of a home if there are existing structural or maintenance issues, warn experts. Siding replacement, HVAC system repair or replacement, a new roof, and basement dampness prevention solutions can be smarter investments before other flashy remodels. Many buyers have a strict budget for a house, and those buyers may be more likely to buy a house with lit-

tle or no maintenance issues. Such buyers will then upgrade the kitchen or baths themselves, according to Harvard's Joint Center for Housing Studies.

· Worthy window replacement. Angie's List, a home services review and referral resource, has found that the average ROI of new windows is 77 percent. The cost of installation and energy savings tend to offset at around the 10-year point.

If remodeling is on the horizon, homeowners should give strong consideration to ROI before choosing a project.

Choose from two recipes to grill or roast tender, juicy steak

This week, you have your choice of two sirloin steak recipes, both from Paths of Sunshine Cookbook.



The first is Harry's Marinated Sirloin Steak that is for cooking on the grill, and the second is simply Sirloin Steak Roast for roasting in the oven. Both recipes look simple, and the ingredients in the marinades should tenderize the meat.

HARRY'S MARINATED SIRLOIN STEAK Recipe from Florida Federation of Garden Clubs.

Paths of Sunshine Cookbook 2/3 cup soy sauce

Juice of one lemon

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Well worth the effort!! Place whole cucumbers in large pot. Use stainless steel, glassware, or unchipped enamel; other metals may react and cause color and taste changes. Cover cucumbers with boiling water. Let stand until following day. Repeat this procedure three more days. On fifth day, slice cucumbers. Combine and boil the vinegar, sugar, salt and spices. Pour over sliced cucumbers. Stir. On sixth day, simply stir cucumbers two or three times. On seventh day, separate cucumbers from liquid; drain liquid into pot. Bring liquid to a boil. Add pickles. 

some of the same photographers from before past exhibits. A contest was held through the Lake Apopka North Shore Wildlife Drive Group Facebook page to select the photographers that would show their

This is the first exhibit Shiann Piekarski of Apopka ever displayed her photography. Her work is "Mikey," featuring an upclose shot of a gator. Its opened jaws reveal the tail of its meal, a snake.

"I pulled over where no cars were behind me, and I stopped and had taken a few pictures of the little gator. He kind of moved his mouth, and I thought, 'It looks like he has something in his mouth.' All of a sudden, he opened his mouth and tried to swallow the snake and I got the shot."

She said she often seeks "interesting action shots" such as birds in flight.

Piekarski's mother, an amateur painter, has always advised her to look at things through an artist's eye. "She would point out things to me that maybe I wouldn't notice. Once you got a camera in your face and you frame it out, you start seeing things differently. I always feel like

I'm shooting through my mother's eyes. She taught me how to look at things a little more artistically."

A person doesn't have to be a professional photographer to enjoy the wildlife drive, Wilson said.

"It's kind of like a nojudgment zone," Wilson said. "You get young mothers out there, taking their kids out there. You get elderly or older people out there who need to take their car, and it's a great opportunity for people from all walks of life, and people of all ages to go out there and learn from each other and explore. You don't have to be a professional photographer to go out there. You can just go out there and

One thing Wilson has learned from her time at Lake Apopka Wildlife Drive is how to cultivate patience.

"I don't know how to explain it other than to say to become better, you have to learn that it takes a lot of time to sit and watch and observe the wildlife, and it really helps you to learn patience in your own life, and helps to de-stress and it's good for overall mental health."

Piekarski, who coowns an Apopka web design and Internet marketing company with her husband, said the wildlife drive is the result of the Lake Apopka North Shore cleanup efforts. Her youngest childhood memories are that of the Ocklawaha River, fishing with her family. Lake Apopka is the headwater of the river, thus having created some issues with the Ocklawaha River, which is a tributary of St. Johns Riv-

"It's important that we keep continuing to clean the water, because it wasn't that many years ago that there was a mass killing of white pelicans landing on the lake. No one ever fig-
